A Note from Liz Plachta, Executive Director and Her Most Important Job: Mama to Ruby and Ella Mae

The second I held Ruby for the first time, I knew she was going to change the world. In the nine years since her birth, I have gotten a front-row seat to just how much of an impact her little life is having, not only on those around her, but across the globe. I saw something in her that I wanted the world to see—that the world needed to see—and I cannot tell you how much it means to me to hear from parents with a new diagnosis who share that finding Ruby, Ruby's Rainbow and the faces of our Rockin' Recipients has changed their vision for their own child's future.

This is why the awareness aspect of our mission is so important to me. There is so much more to a person with Down syndrome than a diagnosis. Simply by raising expectations, we are changing lives and creating a more beautiful and inclusive world for people of ALL abilities!

Also, as a mama, it brings my heart so much joy and hope to see what individuals with Down syndrome are accomplishing these days! Did you know that my first goal when we founded Ruby's Rainbow in 2012 was to raise just one \$2,000 scholarship? Imagine my excitement and grateful heart when we were able to give out ELEVEN scholarships that year! Since then, we have granted more than 300 scholarships totaling over \$900,000!!! WHAT?!? And it just keeps growing every year! We simply

could not have done all this without all the love and support from this amazing community, so I hope you will take a moment to look over this report and feel proud of the impact you've helped us make.

In 2019, we conducted a survey of our past and present Rockin' Recipients to learn how they felt about their post-secondary education programs. Did their programs help them work toward their personal and career goals? Had they helped to prepare them for gaining employment and internships that would contribute to job readiness?

What we learned was inspiring, and convinced us that our scholarships are filling a very real need. Post-secondary programs for students with intellectual disabilities are, on average, more expensive than programs for students who don't need those extra supports. Over 80% of survey respondents said attending college would have been difficult or impossible without their Ruby's Rainbow scholarships, with fully 40% of those saying they would not have been able to attend if they hadn't received a scholarship. This is key, as research shows that attending post-secondary education makes all the difference for people with intellectual disabilities in becoming working, contributing members to society.

Our scholarship recipients are also making another, less tangible yet still deeply important impact in their own communities. In college, they develop friendships, mentorships and other relationships with people who care about them, who follow them even after they graduate and move on. As my dear friend Amanda Booth says, "If Down syndrome is something that is recognizable, then it will be familiar. And when something is familiar, it is welcomed." These relationships that our Rockin' Recipients are able to develop in college benefit everyone, increasing familiarity and acceptance not just for them personally, but for all people with disabilities.

All of this is why my promise to you is to keep on shouting as loud as I can that people with Down syndrome are capable, amazing and worthy. I promise to continue sharing their stories to inspire others while helping as many peeps rockin' that extra chromosome as I can to go for their dreams of higher education and independence!!



Access to Post-Secondary Education Helps Rockin' Recipients Build Career Skills and Find Jobs and Internships

Our survey of our past and present Rockin' Recipients included questions about how their post-secondary programs had prepared them for gaining employment and internships that would contribute to career readiness. What we learned was inspiring.

The outlook for adults with intellectual disabilities (ID) in the workforce is brightening, but it has historically been grim, and there's still room for improvement. According to data published by Special Olympics, only 44% of adults with intellectual disabilities are in the labor force, and fully 28% of adults with ID have never had a job. Data from Think College reveals only 40% of students with ID who were exiting college programs in 2015 had a paid job within 90 days.

At Ruby's Rainbow, our Rockin' Recipients tell a different story. According to data we gathered from our survey respondents:




Awesomeness at Ruby's Rainbow in 2019!

Attaining Life Goals

Moving out of their parents' home, living with roommates, graduating college—these are major life milestones for many young adults, including those who are rockin' an extra chromosome. In the not-so-distant past, individuals with Down syndrome rarely lived independently, and pursuing higher education was nearly unheard of. Thanks to early intervention programs, increasingly inclusive education and work opportunities, and other markers of progress, people living with intellectual disabilities now have more access than ever before to the same types of opportunities, milestones and life experiences as everyone else.

Of course, we still have a ways to go. According to 2017 data published by The Arc of the United States in their annual FINDS report, 80% of individuals with intellectual disabilities live with a caregiver who is a family member, and 50% of people with ID leave high school without a diploma.

The Ruby's Rainbow crew is so proud of our Rockin' Recipients, who are defying these statistics all over the country! Our survey of our past and present recipients revealed that their college programs have helped them develop independent living skills along with the confidence needed to follow their dreams. Over half of our survey respondents are living independently, and 97% are either actively enrolled in post-secondary programs or have already graduated. Furthermore, 96% of respondents reported they were very glad they pursued higher education and felt their college experiences were helping them reach their dreams.

This makes our hearts smile so BIG over here, knowing the impact we are making in their lives, and that these programs are increasing the independence and overall quality of life for our recipients!!


