

Mission & Goals

At Ruby's Rainbow, we grant scholarships to adults with Down syndrome in the U.S. who are seeking post-secondary education, enrichment or vocational classes.

Our mission is to support these inspiring individuals in achieving their dreams of higher education while spreading awareness of their capabilities and general awesomeness!

Today, there are more college and university programs for individuals with intellectual disabilities than ever before. Students with Down syndrome are helping to change the educational



landscape, and Ruby's Rainbow is committed to keeping pace with these ever-increasing educational opportunities.

We are passionate about supporting students with Down syndrome as they pursue their college dreams!

Eligibility Criteria

Ruby's Rainbow scholarship applicants must meet the following criteria:

- This grant is for individuals with Down syndrome, living in the United States, who are 18 years of age or older.
- Applicants must have the desire and intent to enroll or continue enrollment in a class or program that will enhance their lives through employment, independent living or life skills, or interests in any other areas.
- Applicants must provide a high school diploma, transcript or equivalent. A college transcript or letter from program is also acceptable.
- Individuals who have previously been awarded a Ruby's Rainbow scholarship may now apply again the following year by filling out our Re-Apply Application.

About Ruby's Rainbow scholarships:

- Ruby's Rainbow Scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$10,000 per awarded individual, subject to availability of funds.
- Scholarship funds must be used within one year.
- This grant must be used to pay for tuition for a post-secondary program at a college, educational institution, or employment training program. A portion may also be used to pay for books, supplies or other related expenses, but the majority of the grant must be used for tuition.



How It All Started

In December 2010, a little girl named Ruby Plachta was born in Austin, Texas — a month early, and rockin' a surprise extra 21st chromosome. Liz and Tim, her parents, realized their hopes and expectations for Ruby were just the same as for their older daughter: They envisioned both their children becoming lifelong learners and making meaningful contributions to society.

The Plachtas knew they wanted to do something extraordinary to help this community of inspiring people. But while post-secondary educational opportunities were expanding for individuals with Down syndrome, Liz and Tim learned that educational funding for these students was nearly non-existent.

Founded in 2012, Ruby's Rainbow grew out of the Plachtas' belief that everyone is a lifelong learner, and that learning does not — and should not — stop after high school.



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
